Improvisational Pedagogy

I argue that improvisation, understood as an in-process, often communicative act of creativity under conditions of uncertainty, is a permanent and inescapable component of all effective pedagogical exchanges. I begin with a close analysis of the pedagogical and ideological difficulties attending (in Harvey Siegel's phrase) the education of reason, or the development of skills and habits of thought required to mount a creative, effective response to life's challenges. In the context of a fictional dialogue between three educators (with Matt Silliman, co-author), I have the characters survey recent philosophical work in aesthetics and the philosophy of music, concluding that improvisation is not (as it is sometimes pre-critically assumed to be) the absence of structure, but rather creative, exploratory variation within an established framework of expectations and conventions. From this understanding it follows that even the most formalized presentation, performance, or social interaction inevitably involves some degree of improvisation.
